

Going do

"I'm going to" is for things you intend to do: "I'm going to wake up at 7:15 tomorrow." "I will" involves deciding (an act of will, if you will...) at that moment: "OK, I'll call you later then." Will vs. Going To. The real difference in meaning between "will" and "going to" lies in their time frames. In spelling and grammar rules, "will" is commonly used in formal settings and often depicts a certain action that will happen soon. It's usually more spontaneous than "be going to," which refers to future events that have been planned.

I'll do it after dinner. I can't decide what to wear tonight. I know! I'll wear my green shirt. There's no milk. I'll buy some when I go to the shops. going to. We use going to to talk about plans decided before the moment of speaking. I'm going to phone Mum after dinner. I told her I'd call at 8 o'clock. I'm going to wear my black dress tonight.

I am going to see a play tonight. (I'm going to see a play tonight.) It's late so I don't think he's going to do his homework tonight. Look at those clouds. It's going to rain soon. We're not going to see my mother this summer. My favorite team is going to play tomorrow evening. He's going to tell his boss he's resigning today.

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Going to is also used when there is evidence in the present that emphasizes something will happen. You're going to fall if you don't tie your shoelaces. The structure of using going to in future tense is: subject + form of "to be" (am/is/are) + going to + base of a verb. I am going to travel to Ireland for vacation next month.

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
